

Aggression and Seroxat

The link between severe aggression and agitation during Seroxat treatment is well established. The much-publicised US Tobin court case, in which Donald Schell shot his wife, daughter and grand-daughter, exemplifies the dangerous effect that Seroxat can have on patients in the early days of treatment.

What is less well known, is that many users experience these symptoms both while on a therapeutic dose and particularly on withdrawal.

Users often report a feeling of great rage, excessive irritability, agitation, feelings of wanting to do harm to self or others, even though they have never been like this in their life before; this is often a dramatic change in personality.

Everyone is affected differently. It is important to remember that there is a high possibility that aggressive behaviour may be an adverse reaction to Seroxat. You should report it to your doctor and if it ever becomes overwhelming, seek urgent medical advice.

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
